



The Maayama-li Dress was designed by First Nations designer Julie Shaw and made in collaboration with Aboriginal weavers of Bula'bula Art Centre in remote Arnhem Land. A couture-inspired piece, the bodice was made using plant materials harvested from Country, using ancient traditional weaving techniques of the Yolngu people. The skirt section was made from deadstock fabric, using couture draping techniques by seamstress/ draper Alice Cliff. This dress is a celebration of artisans coming together to achieve a creative vision, and representing the intersection of high fashion & Indigenous design.



This watch applies an unsymmetrical layout to arrange the elements on the dial and uses delicate 3D images to reproduce real-world scenes, which makes this watch full of fun and art.



Wacky Pack explores the possibilities of footwear closure by trailblazing unorthodox construction and fastening method. Wacky Pack delivers unique yet diverse interactions between the shoe and the user, providing a new level of improvisation and customization to match different styles, from day-to-day look to red carpets.

The Knit Boot

Lead Designer(s): Yuki Zhi Yi Xu Prize: Bronze in Boots

Description: Combining shaggy mohair with with Elastomeric, Yuki Xu creates unique threedimensional artistic designs that transcends conventional standards of knitwear and footwear. The knit's surface texture is created with the domestic knitting machine's automated jacquard punch card mechanism, and its convex ovals are augmented via a handmade Trapunto leather technique. 3D printed PLA solids that mimic the jacquard's design motifs are sandwiched and glued between the lining and the boot upper to give an illusionary synthesis between the two materials.

Description: M704GR walking shoes, designed with "convenience" at its core, make shoe putting on a breeze. Activated by a charging mat, SMA springs within the sole unfold the heel, providing hand-free foot entry & exit.

FibeRobo

Lead Designer(s): Jack Forman Prize: Gold in New technology fabrics Description: FibeRobo is a novel bodytemperature shape-changing fiber based on liquid crystal elastomers. The development of a new fabrication technique and chemical composition of the fiber enables self-reversing morphing at, or optionally slightly above, body temperature. These fibers, once formed into the larger textile structure through knitting, weaving, and sewing techniques, enables a myriad of applications from medical devices (compressions shirts), athletic wear (selfventilating clothing), to interactive eating experiences (morphing table cloths), and transforming fashion pieces.

Prize: Silver in New technology fabrics Description: The design inspiration of this series comes from parametric virtual graphics with a sense of technology. The design of fabric is made by extracting human body model data for parametric transformation. Through innovative research and practice on the combination of parametric clothing fabric and Arduino steering gear structure, the design tries to integrate user personalized data records into clothing, making the clothing more experimental and interactive in the use of human body.

Coat of Many Colors

Holon Institute of Technology, Israel Lead Designer(s): Neta Cohen

Prize: Bronze in New technology fabrics Description: In addition to being an Industrial Design student I'm also a skydiving instructor. My project addresses an Israeli parachute manufacturer producing 2,000 parachutes annually, with 15% material waste (15,000 sqm of fabric). I propose a circular design model using a fabric shredding machine to repurpose waste, creating a new product line. Larger fabric pieces are sewn together into fabric for coat patterns, and smaller ones are shredded to become insulation.

Space Wedding

Bang Prize: Bronze in Textile/print design Description: In 2022, I felt like I was missing something in my life and couldn't pinpoint what that feeling was. I didn't know if it stemmed from my home, family, desire to settle down, etc. I asked myself those questions, which led to the self-reflecting inquiry of "why don't I want to marry myself as an art performance?"
